But I couldn't have done it without the outpouring of love and support I received from Carlos Rosario School students, staff, and supporters. And here we are now at the end of another successful school year. At our annual graduation this June we celebrated the successes of more than 300 graduates and awarded 21 scholarships to students continuing on to higher education. When I reflect back on all the accomplishments we have reached together this year, I am so proud. We were granted full re-accreditation by the Middle States Association, we hosted ambassadors from the Culinary Institute of America, we presented best practices in adult education at various conferences, and we celebrated our rich cultural heritage with our annual festivals, just to name a few accomplishments. 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Celebrating Carlos Rosario School's Heroes

For this year's Carlos Rosario School graduation, presided over by President and Founder Sonia Gutierrez, we were pleased to welcome many key community leaders to share with us the successes of our students. Greetings were brought from Patrick Mara Ward 1 Representative from the DC Board of Education; Brian Jones Chairman of the DC Public Charter School Board; Jose R. Alvarez, Chief of Staff, Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE); and Alberto Gomez Chairman of the



Carlos Rosario School Board of Trustees. A special recognition was delivered by Honorable Anibal Gomez Toledo, Consul of the Embassy of Mexico. Other key attendees included Ms. Celia Yaneth Medrano, Consul General from the Embassy of El Salvador, and David Ivey-Soto from the Culinary Institute of America. Showing their strong support for the School and our students, six Carlos Rosario School board members and multiple advisory committee members were in attendance.



An emotional rendition of "Hero" sung by Tara Villanueva, Creative Arts Coordinator, captured the spirit of this year's graduation. Community leaders and key school supporters echoed this sentiment as they congratulated students on their heroic efforts to make continuing education a priority for themselves, for their children and for their communities. A crowded auditorium shared in the triumphs of the more than 300 graduates from Culinary Arts, Nurse Aide, Computer Support Specialist, Customer Service, GED, English as a Second Language Level 8 and Citizenship.

This graduation, however, is just one step along a continuing path, and looking to the future, 21 scholarships were awarded to students who will go on to higher education institutions. Before the funds were awarded, Supportive Services Director Tina Guzman asked students, staff and supporters who contributed to the scholarship fund through attending the school dance, buying candy, purchasing a school water bottles, and donating from pay checks to stand. Looking over the auditorium filled with smiling students, staff, and supporters on their feet, it was easy to see how committed the school community is to ensuring that students have the opportunity to continue their studies. The ceremony was concluded by Allison Kokkoros, Chief Academic Officer, who encouraged all in attendance to continue to dream big.

Students, alumni, staff, community members, and industry professionals watched renowned Culinary Institute of America ambassadors turn exotic ingredients into

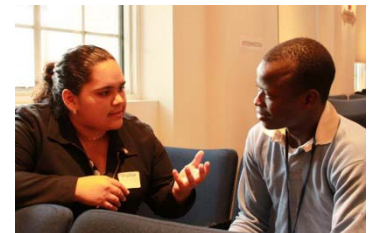

Culinary Students Share a Tasty and Nutritious Snack: Banana-Almond Smoothies

4 large ripe bananas, peeled, sliced and frozen - (alternately you can use 2 bananas and 2 cups of ice instead of the 4 frozen bananas)



2 cups almond milk (soy or regular milk may be substituted)
1- 12 oz. box of Silken Tofu
2 tablespoons (packed) golden brown sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Ground nutmeg

Blend all ingredients, except for the nutmeg in blender until smooth

Sharing Best Practices as Leaders in Adult Education

Supporting teachers and staff as they learn, grow, and share with others is a top priority at the Carlos Rosario School. This spring as leaders in the field of adult education our teachers and staff presented at various conferences. At the annual Commission on Adult Basic Education (COABE) Conference, Professional Development Specialist, Carole Fuller, discussed managing online networks with adult education professionals. She focused on the many ways twitter can be used as a professional development resource. Drawing from her years of experience as an ESL level 1 teacher, HollyAnn Freso-Moore presented on speaking activities for low level English speakers also at the COABE Conference. At the Delmarva TESOL Conference, Principal Dr. Ryan Monroe focused on Sheltered Instruction Observation Protocol (SIOP) for workforce training instruction. This practical workshop highlighted our steps to train teachers on the SIOP model and the successes these teachers have had in the classroom.
