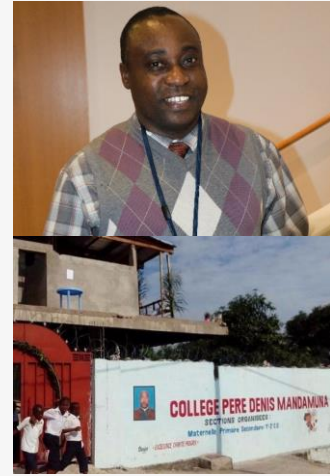
Congratulations Rosie!
